CPT provides organizational support to persons committed to faith-based nonviolent alternatives in situations where lethal conflict is an immediate reality or is supported by public policy. CPT seeks to enlist the response of the whole church in conscientious objection to war, and the development of nonviolent institutions, skills and training for intervention in conflict situations. We believe that the mandate to proclaim the Gospel of repentance, salvation and reconciliation includes a strengthened Biblical peace witness.

We believe that faithfulness to what Jesus taught and modelled calls us to more active peacemaking.

We believe that a renewed commitment to the Gospel of Peace calls us to new forms of public witness which may include nonviolent direct action.

Background

Christian Peacemaker Teams (CPT) arose out of a call in 1984 for Christians to devote the same discipline and self-sacrifice to nonviolent peacemaking that armies devote to war.

Today, CPT places violence reduction teams in situations of crisis and areas of militarization both locally and around the world. CPT embraces the vision of unarmed intervention waged by committed peacemakers ready to risk injury and death in bold attempts to transform lethal conflict through the nonviolent power of God's truth and love.

Initiated by Mennonites, Brethren and Quakers with broad ecumenical participation, CPT's ministry of Biblically-based and spiritually-centred peacemaking emphasizes negotiation, protection of human rights, creative public witness and nonviolent direct action. A strategy developed thoughtfully over the years has taught us that:

- Trained, skilled teams from "the outside" can work effectively to spur and support local efforts toward nonviolent peacemaking;
- "Getting in the way" of injustice through direct nonviolent intervention, public witness and reporting to the larger world community can make a difference;
- Peace team work engages congregations, meetings and support groups at home to play a key advocacy role with policy makers

Violence Reduction Projects

Hebron, West Bank - a continuing presence since June, 1995 standing with Palestinians and Israeli peace groups engaged in nonviolent opposition to Israeli military occupation, bombings, collective punishment, home demolitions and land confiscation.

Colombia - a continuing presence since May, 2001 supporting Colombian Christians working to end violence in the river communities around Barrancabermeja; public prayer and fasting in response to huge infusions of foreign military aid and widespread killings.

Iraq - a Baghdad-based presence since October 2002, walking with the Iraqi people as they endured the US-led 2003 war, continuing to bear witness to post-war Iraq and calling the US government to acts of responsibility rather than killing and destruction.

Asubpeeschoseewagong - a continuing presence since November 2002 in Grassy Narrows, ON, standing with the Anishnaabe people as they resist the clear-cutting of their land through nonviolent means such as blockading logging trucks.

Urban North America - a periodic presence since 1994 in various communities experimenting with inner-city violence reduction; prayer vigils, neighbourhood patrols, and nonviolent campaigns in response to murders and drug-related violence; Washington, DC (1994-1996), Richmond, VA (1997-1999), Cleveland, OH (2000-present).

Regional CPT Groups - CPT Corps members, Reservists and supporters have formed regional groups in the UK, Ontario, Colorado, Indiana and Ohio to focus on local peace witness and under gird CPT's ongoing violence-reduction efforts.

CPT - "Getting in the Way"

Violence Reduction Projects - Peace team presence of three months or longer in specific conflict settings at the invitation of local peace workers.

Peacemaker Delegations - Short-term teams travel to crisis settings to protect human rights, engage in public peace witness, and report to home churches.

Peacemaker Corps - A body of trained peacemakers available full-time to staff CPT's violence reduction projects.

Reserve Corps - A pool of individuals available to join CPT projects and delegations for two weeks to two months each year.

Peacemaker Training - Four weeks of intensive preparation for Corps members and Reservists.

Special Campaigns - Church-wide actions to support nonviolent peacemaking; can include special calls for public prayer and fasting in response to specific crises or during particular liturgical seasons.

Campaign for Secure Dwellings (CSD) enlists churches and groups in efforts to stop the demolition of Palestinian homes by Israeli authorities.

"Violence Is Not Child's Play: 500 Churches for Change" campaign of churches and groups engaging in nonviolent activities to challenge retailers marketing violent toys and games to children.
